Pursuant to notice published in the Valley Voice on Thursday May 18, 2023, the Cambridge City Council convened in open public meeting at 6:30 P.M. on June 5, 2023 at the Cambridge Community Building, 722 Patterson Street. Present were Mayor David Gunderson, City Council Members Vernita Saylor, John Kutnink, Jeff Ommert, Nora McGowen and Kevin Banzhaf. City Councilman Mike Harris was absent. City Staff present were City Clerk/Treasurer Courtney Stanton and Utility Supervisor Dave Houghtelling. Visitors present were Jessica Fisher, Kristi Shoemaker, Leroy Hayes, and Genny Kubik. Mayor Gunderson opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. Mayor Gunderson announced the open meeting law is posted on the east wall of the meeting room and available for public inspection.

## Public Hearing: Conditional Use Permit Application for Roger and Kathleen Seymour for a Short Term Rental at 914 Niobrara St.

Mayor Gunderson opened the public hearing at 6:31 P.M. and read by title the purpose of the public hearing. Conditional Use Permit Application for Roger and Kathleen Seymour for Short-term Rental at 914 Niobrara. There were no public comments. Mayor Gunderson closed the public hearing at 6:33 P.M.

Mayor Gunderson read aloud the findings of fact. City Council discussed and was in agreement that the findings of fact support the minimum requirements as stated below. The seven minimum requirements were provided in writing by the Owner and attached to the application as "Exhibit 1".

A conditional use permit shall not be granted unless specific written findings of fact directly based upon the particular evidence presented support the Minimum Requirements.

- The proposed conditional use complies with all applicable provisions of these regulations, including intensity of use regulations, yard regulations and use limitations.
   City Council agreed that the conditional use permit complies with the zoning regulations, yard regulations and use limitations.
- 2. The proposed conditional use at the specified location will not adversely affect the welfare or convenience of the public.
  - City Council agreed that the conditional use at 914 Niobrara will not adversely affect the welfare or convenience of the public.
- 3. The proposed conditional use will not cause substantial injury to the value of other property in the neighborhood in which it is to be located.
  - City Council agreed conditional use will not cause substantial injury to the value of other properties in the neighborhood in which it is to be located.
- 4. The location and size of the conditional use, the nature and intensity of the operation involved in or conducted in connection with it, and the location of the site with respect to streets giving access to it are such that the conditional use will not dominate the immediate neighborhood so

as to prevent development and use of neighboring property in accordance with the determining whether the conditional use will so dominate the immediate neighborhood, consideration shall be given to:

- a. The location, nature and height of buildings, structures, wall and fences on the site, and,
- b. The nature and extent of landscaping and screening on the site.

City Council agreed conditional use at 914 Niobrara will not dominate the immediate neighborhood, with consideration to the location, nature and height of buildings, structures, wall and fences on the site, and nature and extent of landscaping and screening on the site.

- 5. Off-street parking and loading areas will be provided in accordance with the standards set forth, in these regulations, and such areas will be screened from adjoining residential uses and located so as to protect such residential uses from any injurious effect.
  City Council agreed with the information provided by Roger and Kathleen Seymour that off-street parking and loading areas have been addressed and will be provided in accordance with these regulations.
- 6. Adequate utility, drainage, and other such necessary facilities have been or will be provided. City Council agreed property at 914 Niobrara has established adequate utility, drainage, and other necessary facilities.
- 7. Adequate access roads or entrance and exit drives will be provided and shall be so designed to prevent traffic hazards and to minimize traffic congestion in public streets and alleys.

  City Council agreed the property at 914 Niobrara has adequate access roads or entrance and exit drives.

John Kutnink stated the motion, seconded by Vernita Saylor, to approve the Conditional Use Permit for Roger and Kathleen Seymour for a Short Term Rental at 914 Niobrara. Voting yes were Vernita Saylor, John Kutnink, Jeff Ommert, Nora McGowen and Kevin Banzhaf; absent and not voting was Mike Harris. Motion carried unanimously by City Council members present.

The city will have Lisa Shifflet, City Attorney draft a lease agreement with the terms stated above.
